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The Theology of “Doing” and “Being” Two sides of the same the coin.

Last month at the Finance Committee meeting, several questions were raised; How do we as a church stay solvent and be sustainable? and how do we continue the mission of the Church in Hopewell? There is a legitimate concern that the demographic of our church (70% being over 70 years old), is not conducive to sustain the financial constraints and meet the human resource demands to run the church. Most people in this demographic are retired, live on a fixed income and have limited mobility. Out of this concern, the obvious question is what does it take to attract new generations of worshippers to HUMC, especially the generations X, Y and Z? Over my twenty years in ministry, I have noticed that whenever a church reaches this stage and struggles to attract new members, the first thing that comes to mind is about “doing.” What aren’t we doing right?” People say “We have invested so much and we haven’t yet seen a return on our investment.” They ask “How long shall we continue to do this? We are getting too old and can’t do much at this point.” Those questions are certainly legitimate and relevant. But I always wonder whether it is all about “doing?” Don’t get me wrong, I understand that the dynamics of “doing” is essential in the growth of a church. But it is only one side of the coin.

Churches that spend too much time on the “doing” are always caught up in a paralysis and panicking mode. The theology of doing exhausts, discourages and stops the social imagination. In this theology, the end justifies the means. Churches that focus on this path alone decline fast and, in most cases, close down. I believe that “doing” should go together with “being.” I call this duality the theology of the two sides of the coin. Doing and being go together. Before you do, you are. Your essence pre-determines you’re doing. Without your being, there is no doing. Our culture is prone to doing rather than being. Most of us when asked to introduce ourselves tend to talk about what we do instead of who we are. This analogy applies to churches as well. Churches that include the theology of “being” thrive and are always resourceful. To them, the means determines the end. People internalize their mission and vision and stay faithful to it. They know that a greater power is in action and helps grow the seed. People in this theology are bound to one another and to the community. They focus on what makes them what they are. They hold on to the core identity which might be traditional or an emerging one.

In a recent publication **“The Great DE -churching: Who’s Leaving, Why Are They Going and What Will It Take to Bring Them Back?”** the authors argue that in our society, America’s institutions tend to work better for those who belong to a nuclear family, have a college degree and have children after marriage. Those who get off track of this model have serious difficulties in our country. Our institutions are prone to favor the former. The authors parallel this analogy to churches. They contend that the church culture can feel unwelcoming and even shaming to people who are struggling financially or have family structures outside of the model that society favors. According to the authors, modern American churches are financially incentivized to target the wealthy and create a space where those on track feel comfortable. The average American church, the authors muse, is not truly hospitable to the less fortunate, making them feel like outsiders in our midst. I am under no illusion that reversing this trend will fill church pews. But I strongly believe that a church that wants to be relevant, thrive and attract the generations X, Y and Z (which includes many “Nones”) should deconstruct the one-dimensional approach in our society that favors some and ignores others. The church needs to re-discover its true identity, mission and vision. The synergy that makes the church thrive is coupling its doing with its being. It becomes like a tree planted near a river. The prophet Jeremiah put it this way, “But blessed is the one who trusts in the LORD, whose confidence is in him. They will be like a tree planted by the water that sends out its roots by the stream. It does not fear when heat comes; its leaves are always green. It has no worries in a year of drought and never fails to bear fruit” (Jeremiah 17:7-8).

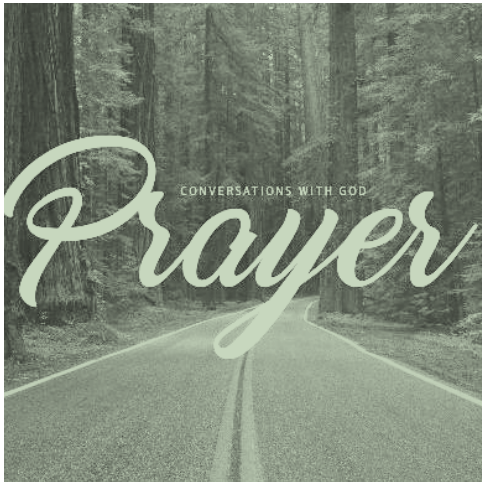
Worship Update

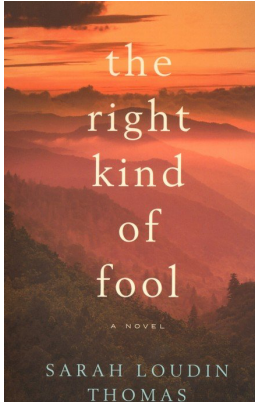

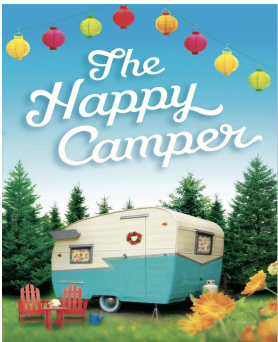

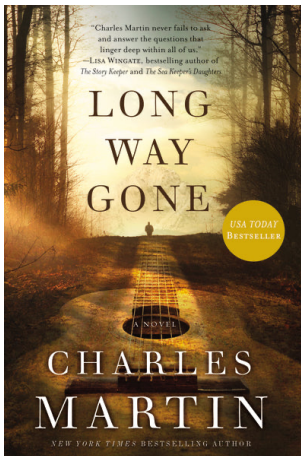
